

These calculations vary. We have considered the most conservative estimate from SNAP (Spay Neuter Assistance Program): "508 dogs and 4,948 cats can be born from one unsterilized female and her offspring in 7 years."

WE ARRIVED AT MANCHAY!!



Where is it located?

Manchay is a low-income community in the Pachacamac region of Lima, Peru. Due to poverty and lack of access to veterinary care, many dogs and cats suffer from abandonment, malnutrition, and disease in the streets.

OUR IMPACT



In Manchay, most animals arrive at the vet clinic with flea and tick infestations due to the area's environmental conditions: unpaved roads and high levels of dust and dirt.

For this reason, we have added an additional blood test before each procedure.

As a result over a hundred dogs and cats that were not fit for surgery based on their blood results received veterinary treatment and were rescheduled for sterilization on future dates.



During the visit in El Agustino, we assessed the area and spoke with local residents.

We noticed a high number of stray animals and as a result, we decided to increase our support in the zone from 100 to 150 surgeries per month for stray dogs and cats.
